Comprehensive Community Services (CCS) and Coordinated Services Teams (CST):

Richland County Health and Human Services has two programs. The CCS program is a psychosocial rehabilitation program through Medicaid that offers intensive service facilitation and funding for a wide variety of services for children and adults with mental health or alcohol and other drug abuse issues.

The CST program is a new approach to working with families. This program stresses collaboration between providers, is strength based and family centered. For more information on any of these programs call 647-8821.

Justice Programs:

Services. This unit investigates reports of child abuse and neglect, links families with parent education programs, and other services, develops and monitors the foster home program, provides access to independent livings skills training, and enforces family and youth related court orders.

Birth to Three Program:

This is a Richland County Health and Human Services program for children who may need extra help with catching up to other children their own age in mobility and speech. Free screenings and evaluations. Parents are part of the team and help decide what their child may need. To refer your child, call 647-8821 and ask for the KIDS Coordinator.

Special Education:

Special Education is a set of school programs that have been developed to meet the educational needs of children with learning or emotional disabilities. Usually the school will determine if a child needs special education during the Individualized Education Program (IEP) process. Each school district will have a designated Special Education contact person. Contact your district with questions.



SWCAP Head Start and Early Head Start:

Head Start and Early Head Start are free child development programs for children birth to age 5 and their families. Head Start/Early
Head Start provide a variety of education,
health and family services to enrolled families such as preschool, play groups and home visits.
